

Police & Crime Prevention

Sycamore Township Trustees are committed to fighting the opioid/heroin epidemic. The Trustees have partnered with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Regional Narcotics Unit in their efforts to get drugs off the streets. Since late 2014, Sycamore Township has paid for a Regional Narcotics Unit (RENU) officer who works with a team from the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office focused on investigation of

criminal organizations and individuals responsible for trafficking of controlled substances.

REGIONAL NARCOTICS UNIT (RENU)

The Regional Narcotics Unit is a multi-jurisdictional drug task force that is comprised of Narcotics Agents from the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office, Cincinnati Police Department, Sycamore Township and Anderson Township. This unit is designed to investigate criminal organizations and individuals primarily responsible for the illegal trafficking of controlled substances in the Greater Cincinnati area through the operation of investigative programs, including but not limited to, drug intelligence, drug interdiction and undercover operatives. The Regional Narcotics Unit also assists local, state and federal law enforcement agencies when requested. Listed below are just a few of the stats from the Regional Narcotics Unit:

OFFICER SPOTLIGHT



K-9 Enforcement Officer Matthew Alexander is a 12 year veteran with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office. Enforcement Officer Alexander has served the citizens of Sycamore Township the last four years on night shift and recently became a K-9 Officer. His K-9 partner is Brutus, a one-and-a-half-year-old Belgian Malinois. Brutus is a dual purpose K-9

who is trained in Narcotics detection, tracking and apprehension, as well as building and article searches. In just the short time that Enforcement Officer Alexander and K-9 Brutus have been partners, they have successfully tracked a missing suicidal subject, located a gun that was tossed away by a bad guy during a chase and located numerous amounts of narcotics leading to arrest. K-9 Enforcement Officer Alexander and Brutus are a valuable asset for the citizens of Hamilton County and Sycamore Township. Enforcement Officer Alexander is a 2003 Oak Hills High School graduate and is married with four children ages 11, 10, 9, and 4.





EMS/Fire Department

Sycamore Township paramedic services responds to a large number of elderly residents that live alone or with a spouse or companion of the same age. We have treated patients for a wide variety of issues from falls to drug overdoses.

Please review these safety tips which we hope will help prevent a lot of incidents and allow for safer and healthier living conditions for our residents:

- If you live alone, consider a Medical Alert System. If you fall and can't get up you will be able to call for help. If you cannot afford one, carry a cordless phone with you around the house so you can call for help if you fall down.
- Wear proper fitting shoes with low heels. Too large of a shoe or sloppy fitting shoes can cause you to stumble and fall.
- If you need assistance with walking, use a cane or walker to help keep your balance. Do not rely on walls or furniture for balance. Make sure the cane or walker is fitted to your height so you are not bending over when walking.
- Avoid using any throw rugs that can move or slide. If you
 have loose rugs in your home, tape them down securely so
 they don't move when walking on them. Do not place an
 area rug over carpet where the corners of the rug can roll up,
 causing a tripping hazard.
- Do not run extension cords across the floor where you might trip over them. Do not run extension cords under carpet, which can be not only a tripping hazard, but a fire hazard as well.
- Install sturdy hand rails in your bathroom to help you off the toilet and out of the bathtub or shower. Use hand rails when going down or up steps inside and outside your home. Avoid loose gravel on your sidewalk and driveway that can cause you to slip and fall.

- Leave a light on in your bathroom at night.
- Review your medications with your doctor or pharmacist frequently. Make sure you understand any new medications.
- Make sure medications are clearly labeled, and, if needed, ask your pharmacist to print your medications in bold or larger print labels.
- Dispose of any old and unused medications so you don't take the wrong medication by mistake.

You may see the firefighters out and about soon as the Fire Hydrant Painting Program continues. Crews were out last summer doing maintenance and painting the hydrants in the Township and they will be out this summer as well.



If you are grandparents, please feel free to bring your grandchildren to the fire stations for a tour and let them sit on the fire trucks. Don't forget to bring your camera to capture the experience which your grandchild will talk about for weeks.

Summer is here and construction projects in the Township are coming in at full speed. Residential, commercial and industrial our office is getting new projects in almost every day. With new projects, especially in or near residential areas, there also come concerns about effects on the existing neighborhood and possible damage to our roads and adjoining properties. If you see vehicles dumping materials such as mulch, soil, or gravel, or damaging our roads or your neighbor's property, don't hesitate to call our office or the non-emergency dispatch at 825-2280. Sycamore Township does not permit dumping of any material on our roadways, nor do we permit PODS to be left on our streets. PODS, with prior approval from the Township, are to be parked on a paved surface and on private property only.

Sycamore Township has a lot of unique attributes that attract builders from all over the region. With many vibrant communities, low tax rates, great schools and large parcels, we are a prime target for "tear downs" to construct new larger homes. Help us to protect our communities and our roadways by notifying the Township offices if you see a problem.

2017 TRASH BASH NUMBERS

This spring's Township Trash Bash events at the parks were very successful in helping to clean up Township neighborhoods. Not only did we collect 120.48 tons (240,960 pounds) of material that went to the landfill, we were also able to collect quite a bit of recycling that did not go to the landfills. Residents brought in 739 tires, 38 propane tanks, 275 gallons of oil, 5,270 pounds of electronics along with 15,839 pounds of household hazardous waste and 14,511 pounds of paper documents that were shredded. Construction season is here again, which means you will be seeing a lot of orange barrels and cones throughout the Township due to construction zones as we strive to keep your roads among the best in the county. The underground utility project on Galbraith Road continues, and you will see sidewalk being installed on Montgomery Road in Kenwood. In addition, you will also come across a few projects in the neighborhoods. These include:

Donna Lane and Estermarie Drive Reconstruction Project in Dillonvale, this project includes water main replacement and a total removal of all curb and base and surface courses of pavement with installation of new curbs, storm sewers and asphalt.

The 2017 Road Rehabilitation Program, which includes Donegal Dr., Highton Ct., Guam Ct., Jeffrey Ct., Langhorst Ct., and Gwilada Dr. in Dillonvale along with White Chapel Dr., Charter Oak Dr., Ivybrook Ct. and Hermitage Ln. in Kenwood. This will include the removal of

The 2017 Reclamite Program — Reclamite is an asphalt rejuvenation process, that helps extend the life of the pavement. This will be performed on the following streets: Eldora Dr., Glenburny Dr., Glengary Ave., Antrim Ct., Killarney Ct., Trebor Dr., Tralee Ct., Darnell Ave., Mantell Ave., Tramore Dr., Donegal Dr., Wexford Ave., Beech Ave., Lake Ave., Myrtle Ave., Woodlawn Ave., Glenellyn Dr., Grinell Dr., Yakima Dr., Kalama Ct., Silvercrest Dr., Garden Rd., Marview Ave., and Belfast Ave.

The 2017 Onyx Program — Onyx is a Mastic Surface Treatment that seals the existing surface course of asphalt to help extend the life of the pavement. The streets included in this project are: Tiki Ave., Lynnfield Ct., Ginnala Dr., Quailhollow Dr., Michael Dr., Bobby Ln., Myrtlewood Ave., Deerway Ave., Glenover Dr., Appleknoll Ln., Malabar Terrace, Haverhill Ln., Highgate Pl., Foxboro Ct., Briarpatch Ln., Morganraiders Ln., Roundhill Ln., Raidersrun Rd., PawPaw Ln., Stillmeadow Ln., Brittany Dr., Caralee Dr., Hemesath Dr., Autumnwood Dr., Miami Hills Dr., Lisa Ln., Dunlieth Ct., Vinnedge Ct. and Nodding Way.

The 2017 Curb Replacement Program — This will include the removal and replacement of the rolled curb at the street, the existing pavement will remain. This project includes the following streets: Lyncris Dr., Sandymar Dr., Ironwood Ct., Millview Dr. and Pinecove Ct.

In addition to all of these projects you will see the Township Maintenance Crew out on the roads working on base repairs, catch basin repairs, storm sewer installation, crack sealing and all the other tasks that they perform to keep your Township looking good. As always, we ask for your patience and consideration when driving through work zones. Please SLOW DOWN and DRIVE SAFELY to ensure that we get through another construction season safely. STORM DAMAGE COLLECTION

When storms pass through Sycamore Township, you can rest assured that we are looking out for our residents. Storm damage collection is a service that Sycamore Township has provided for many years through the Maintenance Department. Due to the size of the Township, it is not feasible for the Maintenance Department to cover the whole Township every time there is a storm. Therefore, our storm policy requires that residents call the Township to check if a storm has been declared. Superintendent/Assistant Administrator Tracy Kellums declares whether a "storm damage condition" has occurred. If a storm has been declared, residents must call the Sycamore Township Administration Building at 791-8447 to request a pick up or request a storm damage pickup on the action line at www.sycamoretownship.org within two business days in order to have the branches picked up at no charge. Branches must be ready for pick up within two (2) weeks of the storm, stacked at the side of the street, cut ends out.
