It's that time of year again; time to put away the air conditioners, open up the windows and welcome the beautiful fall weather! With open windows, however, our homes become more accessible to burglars if we're not careful. Like most crimes, burglary is a crime of opportunity. If we eliminate the opportunity, we can eliminate some of the crime. Here are a few helpful tips for a safe and enjoyable fall:

- Never leave a door or window open while you are not home.
- Keep windows and doors that are not in use locked.
- While out in the yard cleaning up leaves, or doing yard work, identify those areas of your home that are accessible by standing on any object, the top of a fence or lower roof. Be creative and imagine where someone may climb to gain entry to your home, block off all points of access by keeping everything locked.
- Consider purchasing surveillance equipment, or installing additional lighting with timers for when you are not home, and when it gets dark.
- Take notice of overgrown shrubbery, and trim bushes as needed in areas around your home that provide cover for would-be burglars, such as those shrubs blocking front windows.

With the fall season comes shorter days, and longer nights. Remember these few tips when it comes to preventing other crimes of opportunity:

 Avoid walking alone at night. If you have to walk alone, plan out a route that you're comfortable with, even if it may be out of the way. Stay on well-lit streets, use routes that you know are widely traveled, and avoid shortcuts.

- When you walk, keep your head up, and pay attention to your surroundings.
- We recommend that you do not wear headphones while walking home from work or out exercising.
- Take note of where you park, and have your keys out and readily available prior to arriving at your vehicle.
- When exiting your vehicle, be sure to put the windows up and lock the doors.
- Do not leave valuables in your vehicle. If you must store items in your vehicle for any reason, place them out of view or in the trunk.
- Keep your electronics out of sight in your vehicle; remove car chargers and GPS mounts from view, and clean suction cup marks from your windows and dashboards.

## **EMS/Fire Department**



#### DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME... CHANGE YOUR CLOCKS; CHANGE YOUR BATTERIES IN YOUR SMOKE ALARM!

In the last newsletter, the Fire & EMS Department shared with residents the importance of having a working smoke alarm in your home. Many of you have taken advantage of our smoke alarm program for residents and stopped by the fire station to pick up a free smoke alarm. Our goal is to keep our residents safe. We still have smoke alarms and we don't want anyone in the Township to be without one. Please stop by the fire station anytime to receive your free smoke alarm. Firefighters are on staff 24 hours; if you work during the day, feel free to stop by in the evening.

Once you have installed your smoke alarm, it is important that you have an Escape Plan for your family. Once a smoke alarm sounds, it is vital that you have a plan in place to gather the family together and safely leave the house.

DO NOT go back inside the house for any valuables once everyone is out safely! Tests conducted by the National Fire Protection Association show a house on fire can reach up to 1200 degrees in less than four minutes. By the time you get out and try to go back in the house conditions have changed dramatically. There will be no oxygen in the house to breathe!

#### **ESCAPE PLANNING**

According to an NFPA survey, only one-third of Americans have both developed and practiced a home fire escape plan.

- Almost three-quarters of Americans do have an escape plan; however, less than half actually practiced it.
- One-third of American households who made an escape

plan estimate they thought they would have at least six minutes before a fire in their home would become life threatening. The time available is often much less! In addition, only 8% said their first thought on hearing a smoke alarm would be to get out.

 Almost two-thirds (62%) of reported home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

#### HOW TO MAKE A HOME FIRE ESCAPE PLAN

- Draw a map of your home. Show all doors and windows.
- Visit each room. Find two ways out.
- All windows and doors should open easily. You should be able to use them to get outside.
- Make sure your home has smoke alarms. Push the test button to make sure each alarm is working.
- Pick a meeting place outside. It should be in front of your home.
- Everyone will meet at the meeting place.
- Make sure your house or building number can be seen from the street.
- Talk about your plan with everyone in your home.
- Learn the emergency phone number for your fire department; call 9-1-1.
- Practice your home fire escape drill!

As another hot summer comes to an end, the Planning and Zoning Department is working vigorously to keep up with development and property maintenance complaints. Zoning permit applications are on the rise in all categories and new businesses continue to open within the Township. With the enclosing of the Kenwood Collection building (5901 E. Galbraith), new tenants are being approved and plans for occupancy by the end of this year are underway.

The Buffalo Wild Wings in the Shoppes of Kenwood has recently finished their new façade and interior renovation which includes new seating, wall covering, more TVs and my favorite... great tasting wings. Don't forget about the new Texas Roadhouse going in next to IHOP; it will be opening before the end of this year.

If you were upset about the El Rancho Grande next to IHOP closing, don't fret. It will reopen soon at its new location next to Dodd's Camera. The new location, 6475 East Galbraith Road, will continue to have great Mexican food, adult beverages and outdoor seating.

Other big projects inside the Township are the new TriHealth building at North Creek and the Jewish Hospital patient tower addition. TriHealth will be relocating to its new 113,000 square foot North Creek office building with public garage access. Once relocated, the old building will be razed in preparation for a new multi-story building.

As you may have noticed, Jewish Hospital has been working on enclosing its new addition with plans to occupy the new patient tower sometime in late 2015 or early 2016. This tower, with the addition of more private rooms, improved patient care and a oneof-a-kind gamma knife machine that provides minimally invasive brain surgery, will allow Jewish Hospital to provide better and more advanced care than ever before.



Special Note! The Township passed a resolution several years ago prohibiting obstructions in the right-of-way and dumping of materials in roadways. These items include: mulch, gravel, top soil and dumpsters. If you hire a contractor, please make sure they are aware of this resolution. Should you or your contractor be cited for obstructing the roadway, there will be no warning, only fines up to \$1000 per day of the violation which will be issued to the property owner and the contractor.

Property Maintenance—Don't wait until your neighbor's grass is three to four feet tall; call us at the first sign of a property maintenance issue. Although the economy seems to be on the uptick, we are still dealing with abandoned properties and working with the owners of abandoned properties can be a challenge. There are several ways to file property maintenance complaints with the Township:

#### FALL LEAF PICK UP INFORMATION

Sycamore Township is pleased to provide you with prompt and efficient leaf pick up service. Leaf collection will begin on Monday, October 19th and run through Friday, December 11th. Leaves should be raked to the public right of way beside the street. **PLEASE DO NOT PUT LEAVES IN THE STREET.** Leaves become very slippery when wet and, when parked over, dry leaves can start a car on fire when brought into contact with the catalytic converter. Sticks, grass clippings

#### **BRUSH PICK UP REMINDER**

Please remember when calling in for a storm damage or brush pick up, that the branches should be stacked neatly at the edge of the roadway, cut sides facing the street. Unfortunately, the maintenance staff does not have the resources to pick up brush that is not stacked properly. We appreciate your cooperation. and garden debris will jam our machines and should not be mixed into leaf piles. Consequently, piles with materials other than leaves will not be collected.

Leaf crews will not pick up leaves from under, between or around parked cars. If cars are parked in front of your leaf piles, the collection

equipment will be unable to maneuver to reach the leaves and they will be left for the next pick up cycle in your neighborhood.

Maintenance crews will be working from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. five days a week, rain or shine, to collect leaves in a timely manner. Many factors such as the amount of leaves to be collected and the availability of temporary laborers have an effect on collection and make it impossible to predict exact pick up times.

#### HOSBROOK ROAD TRAFFIC CALMING

Construction has begun on the Hosbrook Road Traffic Calming Project. Ford Development is the contractor. This project extends from Euclid to just south of Ronald Reagan Drive. This will be a lengthy project continuing into winter and spring.

Please be cautious driving through construction areas for your safety and the safety of the workers. We appreciate your patience.
