



#### FIRE HYDRANT FLOW TESTING

In addition to the Fire Hydrant Painting Program that will be going on this summer, I am happy to announce we will also be out flow-testing hydrants. A flow test involves allowing water to flow from the hydrant in order to calculate how much water will flow out and at what rate. This is a necessary test which occurs every five years and helps with your insurance rating. To ensure that residents are aware when hydrants in their area will be tested, we will place signs in the area three days before testing day. During the testing time period, we will also post a list of streets on which



flow testing will take place on our Fire Department website at www.sycamoretownshipfire.org.

#### TOWNSHIP TO ADDRESS OPIOID CRISIS AT COMMUNITY FORUM

As all of us struggle to deal with the current opioid crisis, Sycamore Township is offering a chance to learn about and discuss this important issue. On August 28 at 6:00 p.m., the Township will host a Community Forum in Crawford Auditorium at Deer Park High School, 8351 Plainfield Road. The event is co-sponsored by Prevention FIRST! and the Hamilton County Heroin Coalition, along with our partner organizations the Deer Park Board of Education and Bridge of Hope Church. You'll be able to see presentations, and discuss topics, regarding the Prevention, Treatment, Harm Reduction and Supply Reduction of dangerous drugs. Deer Park High School's C.A.T.S. Youth Coalition will also participate in the program. This event is open to Township residents and non-residents of all ages—anyone who is interested in fighting the drug epidemic that is plaguing our communities.

### TOWNSHIP TIDBITS



#### **OFFICER SPOTLIGHT**

Patrol Officer Gene Nobles is a 16-year veteran of the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office. After coming to the Sheriff's Office in the fall of 2002, Gene's career took an interesting path: Gene is one of our few Patrol Officers who can claim they've worked in all three of the major uniformed Divisions of the Sheriff's Office. Patrol Officer Nobles began his career as a Corrections Officer. After working in our jail facilities for nearly 10 years, Gene was promoted to the Court Services Division. He worked downtown in the Hamilton County Courthouse as a Court Services Deputy for just over three years. Then, in the spring of 2016, Gene was promoted to Patrol. Gene currently runs the northern Sycamore Township beat on dayshift.

There is one aspect of Gene's service that is especially noteworthy. Last fall, Gene created, implemented, and now leads the Sheriff's Office's Military Liaison Group. The purpose of this program is to offer early, street-level mediation and guidance to troubled United States military veterans who come in contact with law enforcement. Whether it is a domestic violence situation, psychiatric emergency, or simple traffic stop, police officers frequently encounter servicemen and women who are experiencing personal difficulties. These interactions have the potential to turn volatile or extremely sensitive, to say the least. Hypothetically, the veteran may be suffering from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder or may have developed a drug or alcohol addiction. He or she might be battling depression or may simply be having a tough time re-adjusting to normal civilian life after a deployment. These situations can be very tense, and the veteran might feel threatened, unstable, or uncomfortable. They may shut down on first-responding officers who are attempting to interact with them. They may refuse to comply with lawful orders. This is where Gene and his colleagues intervene. Gene, drawing on his own military experience, will respond to the scene of an incident and establish communication with the veteran, which, at times, can be a primary stumbling block. He has found that often times, a troubled veteran, once realizing that Gene has "been there," will be more likely to talk, cooperate, and at times, surrender if necessary.

Make no mistake ... this is not a "get out of jail free card." This is not a convenient way for one veteran to help another avoid criminal arrest. The primary purposes of the program are to establish solid communication, defuse and stabilize potentially critical situations, and get the troubled veteran the treatment and resources he or she needs. The ultimate goal is to get the veteran back on track.

Gene is a 20-year military veteran himself. He spent four years on active duty in the United States Marine Corps. He then served as a member of the Army National Guard for 16 years, which included a combat deployment in 2009-2010. Patrol Officer Gene Nobles is leading the charge in aiding a segment of our population that is certainly most deserving of our help. Our veterans, past, present, and

future, serve us. Gene is doing his best to ensure that the Hamilton

County Sheriff's Office is serving them in return.

#### ROAD WORK AHEAD!

Though sometimes it seems like it never ends, construction season is here again. This means that you will be seeing orange barrels and cones throughout the Township in construction zones. Please be alert, watch for construction workers, and drive slowly and carefully through the work zones so that everyone gets home safely to their family at the end of each day. Here are details about a couple of the projects that you will come across this summer:

#### SYCAMORE ROAD RECONSTRUCTION

If you have driven Sycamore Road anytime in the past few months you have seen the utility companies working to move poles and lines throughout the corridor. Their work will continue throughout the year as they move from Plainfield Road toward Kenwood Road.

In the next month, the installation of a new water main will start, along with the commencement of the construction of the roundabout at the Plainfield Road intersection. This project is scheduled to take two years to be completed, so please be patient.

#### THE 2019 CURB REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

This year's curb replacement program will include the full removal and replacement of the curbline; the existing asphalt will remain. This project includes the following streets: Autumnwood Drive, Decima Drive, Tulipwood Court, Elmcrest Drive, Shagbark Drive, Firethorn Court, Brookbridge Drive, and Glenmill Court.

In addition to these projects, you will see our Township maintenance crews throughout the community working on catch basins, storm sewers, base repairs of roadway, crack sealing, sidewalk repair and any other task that needs to be done on the roads or in the parks.

#### **2019 SPRING TRASH BASH NUMBERS**

Once again the Township's spring Trash Bash events were a huge success in helping to clean up Sycamore Township neighborhoods. There were 146.66 tons (293,320 pounds) of material collected for disposal in the landfill. We were also able to collect quite a bit of material to be recycled, including over 700 tires, 500 gallons of oil, 18,880 pounds of household hazardous waste, 33 propane tanks, 80 appliances (which included 54 units with Freon), six skids of electronics, and 20,511 pounds of paper documents that were shredded. Your efforts are greatly appreciated and the Township is very happy to be able to offer this service to its residents.
