Successes in Sycamore Township Five Years Post-Pandemic

As we look back at the events of 2020 and beyond, it is hard to believe what life was like during the COVID-19 pandemic. We were all met with sudden changes to our lives at work and home. There was a lot of fear and anxiety about how the impact of the pandemic would affect life moving forward. In Sycamore Township, your elected officials and their support staff confronted those challenges head-on, continuing to move forward with our commitment to providing quality services and beautifully maintained roads and parks.

We hope you will read all of the articles within this special issue of the Sycamore Quarterly which describe the effects of the pandemic and how each one of our departments adapted to overcome adversity and took advantage of relief funding from the State and Federal levels to benefit our community.

Low Taxes, Quality Services

Sycamore Township is a large urban Township operating on an approximately \$30 million budget. The goal of the Board of Trustees has always been to provide top-notch services for our residents at a low cost:

- Full-service Fire & EMS and police protection for our residents and business community
- A first-rate public works department:
 - One of only six out of 49 total jurisdictions in Hamilton County to offer a curbside fall leaf pickup program. Sycamore Township is one of the few remaining local governments offering free sidewalk replacements. Most other local governments hire a contractor to fix the sidewalk and then bill the property owner or require the homeowner to fix the sidewalk themselves.
 - Annual Trash Bash and document shredding, monthly brush chipping, compost giveaways
 - Well maintained roads and sidewalks
- Beautiful, well maintained, active parks with many amenities
- The only Township that does not charge a fee for common residential zoning permits such as fences, decks, pools, and sheds.

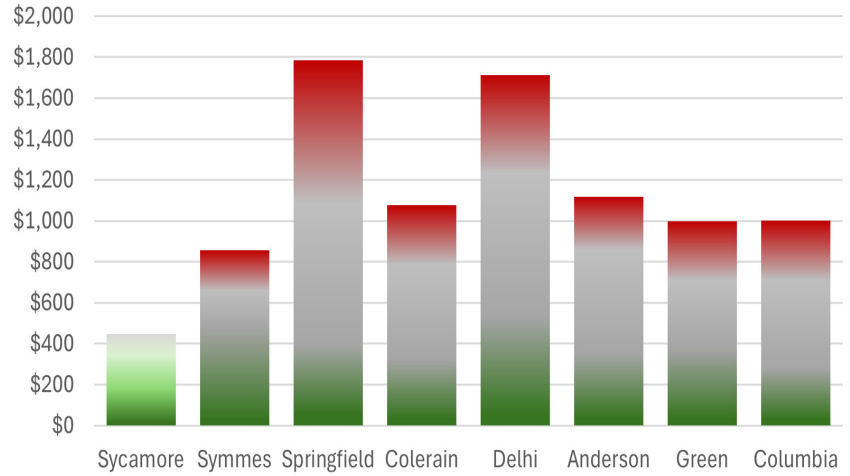

Successes in Sycamore Township Five Years Post-Pandemic

The fact that we deliver so much to our residents is even more notable when you consider that Sycamore Township has not had a property tax levy on the ballot since 2006 and has the lowest property tax rate of any (urban) non-rural township in Hamilton County. For residents in Sycamore Township, approximately 10% of the property tax bill goes to the Township. Property owners in other Hamilton County townships pay anywhere from 16%-30% of their local tax bill to their township. For example, the owner of a \$250,000 home in Sycamore Township pays only \$446 in local jurisdiction taxes. The next closest township charges almost double that.

How Do We Do It?

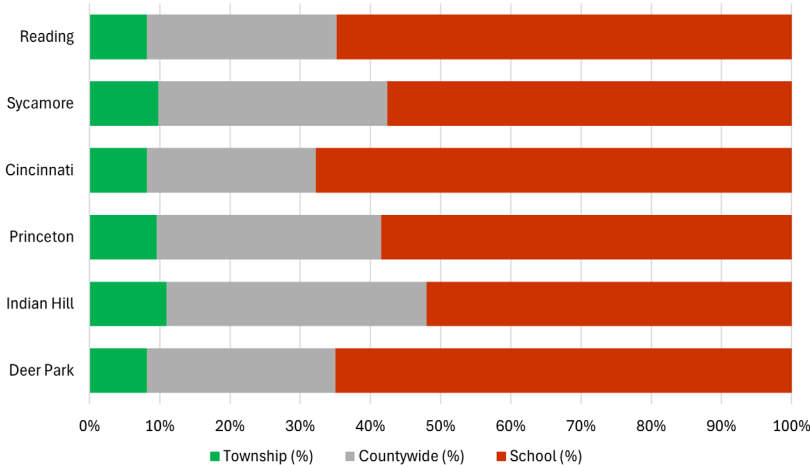
So how does Sycamore Township do it? How do we offer a variety of quality amenities and services for our residents and keep taxes low? Your Board of Trustees has always maintained fiscal responsibility. During challenging times, the Board has proven again and again there are other ways to raise revenue to maintain and expand services without asking the voters to raise property taxes. Two examples of alternative funding are Tax Increment Financing (TIF) and Joint Economic Development Zones (JEDZ), both of which generate revenue for the Township from the business district and not our residents.

Sycamore Township was the first Township in the State of Ohio to utilize Tax Increment Financing which is now the most popular form of economic development. To date, Tax Increment Financing has been used to fund over \$100 million in infrastructure improvements throughout the Township.

Unlike a city, a Township cannot collect an income tax. Sycamore Township took advantage of the opportunity to create Joint Economic Development Zones as an alternative funding source. These agreements created four JEDZ in the Kenwood Business District allowing the Township to partner with adjacent municipalities to generate revenue from commercial businesses within the JEDZ districts. Even after the shift to work from home for many employees since the pandemic, these four districts generate about \$6.5 million in revenue for Sycamore Township annually.

Tax Distribution by School District



This chart represents the distribution of property taxes. For example, a Sycamore Township property owner in the Deer Park School District sees approximately 8% of tax bill go to Sycamore Township with 65% going to Deer Park Schools and the remaining 27% to Hamilton County.

Grants are another source of income for Sycamore Township. It takes a lot of time, effort, and paperwork to write grant applications, but it is worth it when we see the results of the last five years. From Federal Covid Relief Funds to Community Development Block Grants, grants from the Ohio Public Works Commission, SORTA, and many more, Sycamore Township has been awarded millions of dollars in funding to make improvements to our roads, parks, and sidewalks.



The value of services offered to residents for the tax dollars collected is second to none in Hamilton County. Township roads are well-maintained and functional; sidewalks have been repaired and expanded to make our community both pedestrian-friendly and safer. Our parks are beautifully landscaped and offer walking paths, playgrounds, ball fields, and more for the enjoyment of all. First responders in Sycamore Township have modern equipment and the necessary training to offer the best care for our residents and business community. As we reflect on the state of Sycamore Township five years post-pandemic, your Board of Trustees is proud to say that there is still “More in Sycamore!”

Letter from the Trustee

Spring has finally arrived with the hope for warmer weather, green grass, and blooming flowers. It was a long, cold, and snowy winter but that didn't stop our crews from working or Township projects from progressing. January brought one of the largest snowfall events we have seen in years! While other communities were snowed in for days or even weeks, the residents of Sycamore Township were able to travel safely. I'd like to express my gratitude to our road crew for their hard work and dedication to keeping Township streets clear for our residents.

The Euclid Road Sidewalk Project was completed this winter and, despite the weather, has been getting a lot of use. On the personnel side, we spent much of the winter months conducting an extensive search and interview process for a new Assistant Fire Chief. Mike Fronimos was selected from a pool of extremely qualified candidates and began his duties in February. Assistant Chief Fronimos has over 30 years of experience in fire and life safety. Mike comes to us from Fort Gratiot Charter Township Fire Department in Michigan. Welcome to the Township family, Mike!

By the time you receive this newsletter, there should be a couple of other projects that have begun. First, the Kenwood Road Rehabilitation Project will be underway. This project extends from the intersection of Montgomery Road north to the Blue Ash Corp. line and includes new sidewalks, walls, curbs, and resurfacing, and will be funded primarily through a \$4,195,528.00 grant. You'll see construction in the northern section of the Township too as the Kemper Road Sidewalk Project begins. This project extends from Baen Road east to Snider Road and is part of our efforts to improve pedestrian connectivity throughout the Township. The Township received \$1.2 million in additional grant funds for this project. Our team is always looking for funding to improve Township infrastructure while keeping your taxes some of the lowest in the county. As always please drive carefully and be patient through construction zones.

Several other events are coming to the Township this spring including, my personal favorite, the National Day of Prayer at noon on Thursday, May 1st in front of the Township Administration Building. I invite you to please come out and join us! The Township will continue our tradition of hosting the annual VFW Memorial Day Parade along with the City of Deer Park and the Village of Silverton. The parade route begins in Silverton at the old Train Depot, makes a stop along the way at Chamberlain Park in Deer Park, and ends at Bechtold Park in the Township. Please see our website for the registration form if a group you belong to would like to participate in the parade.

Looking ahead to summer will be the return of the Touch a Truck Event on Saturday, June 14th at the Township Complex on Kenwood Road. The Touch a Truck was held for the first time in 2024 and was extremely successful in its inaugural year. Look for this fun event for the whole family to be bigger and better this year! Be sure to mark your calendar for the Tire Discounters Festival in Sycamore on July 18th and 19th featuring Allman Brothers and AC/DC tribute bands on Friday night, as well as Shooting Star and the return of Mark Farner's American Band on Saturday Night. This is a family-friendly event with plenty of food and the popular "Ride for 5" where the kids get to ride festival rides all night for just \$5.00. The Festival is always a great time had by all!

As you can tell, a lot is going on in the Township during the warmer months! I look forward to seeing everyone out and about at these events and throughout the Township. On behalf of my fellow Trustees Tracy Schwegmann and Tom Weidman, along with Fiscal Officer Jon Deters, I would like to wish you all a healthy and safe year.

A significant impact of the COVID 19 pandemic was its negative effect on commercial areas. Office buildings became ghost towns as the majority of people stayed home to work. Retail stores lost customers while consumers shopped for everything from clothing to groceries online. These changes were concerning at the time as the business district is crucial to the economic vitality of Sycamore Township. Fortunately, five years after the pandemic, Sycamore Township is still the most sought-after community for retail and office enterprises. A recent report from the Hamilton County Auditor showed that as of 2024, the Kenwood area of Sycamore Township is now the most valuable area for commercial real estate in all of Hamilton County outside of the Cincinnati Central Business District.

Kenwood Business District Retail

The Kenwood Towne Centre has gained several exclusive retailers, and Kenwood remains the premier shopping destination in the region. Since 2020, notable tenant additions to the Kenwood Towne Centre include Gucci, Watches of Switzerland, Tiffany and Co., Swarovski, and Ray-Ban. All are new to the market tenants with their only Cincinnati presence in Kenwood.



This trend continues with exciting additions coming in 2025 including new restaurants The NorthStar Café and Mi Cozumel along with the January 2025 announcement that Apple will be investing \$4.5 million into the renovation of its Apple Store at the Kenwood Towne Centre.

Other significant developments in the area include the 161-unit, \$150 million Aspire Kenwood Apartments, and mixed-use development across from the Kenwood Towne Centre which opened in 2022. This addition to the business district includes Condado Tacos and the 134-suite Residence Inn by Marriot. Around that same time, Midland Atlantic began renovation to refresh Kenwood Place, located adjacent to the Aspire on Kenwood Road and rebranded it as The Offices at Kenwood Place. This cleared the way for Charles Schwab to open a location there in 2023.

Northern Sycamore Township Growth and Investments

In the northern section of the Township, commercial growth and investment have also continued at a steady pace. Recent developments include Northlake Commons, built in 2024 at the corner of E. Kemper Road and Northlake Drive offers over 35,000 square feet of small office space. The Kids First Sports Complex has also constructed a new building to house The Campus at Kids First, a daycare center. In addition to the commercial development, Paragon Ranch Luxury Apartments is currently under construction on Grooms Road. This development will have 300 luxury residential units built in a modern farmhouse



architectural style with other deluxe amenities such as a pool, individual workstations, a fitness center, a golf simulator, and a pet spa.

Benefits of Planning and Zoning

The attractiveness of Sycamore Township to commercial development is an asset to our community. Not only is it convenient to have restaurants, shopping, and medical offices close to home, but the Township has leveraged economic development strategies such as Tax Increment Financing and JEDZ/JEDD to generate significant alternative funding for roads, safety services, and more which directly benefits our residents, without raising property taxes.



Parks and Recreation

Five years after the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, it is now hard to believe that there was a period of time when playgrounds were closed, and our residents did not get to fully enjoy our beautiful parks! When the playgrounds finally re-opened, Township crews were kept very busy cleaning the restrooms and playground equipment every day.

Wi-Fi, Restrooms, & More!

We did not allow that to bring down our spirits and continued to work and plan to improve our public parks in the most fiscally responsible way possible by utilizing COVID relief funds and seeking alternative grant funding for parks and recreation projects. Thanks to COVID relief funding, Wi-Fi was installed in all public parks in the Township, along with improvements to facilities and restrooms including touchless faucets, bottle fillers, and hand sanitizer dispensers.

Playground Upgrades

In 2022, a new playground was constructed at the Sycamore Township Administration Complex on Kenwood Road. Featuring a variety of swings and large play and climbing structures for big and little kids, this playground is now a popular destination for the many young families who walk along Kenwood Road. This was also the location for the Township's first-ever Touch a Truck event held in 2024 which featured maintenance and police vehicles, fire trucks, and a helicopter landing! We look forward to a repeat of this popular event on June 14th.



A Community Development Block Grant made a big dent in the cost of new playground equipment at Bechtold Park in 2021. At Bob Meyer Park near the Sturbridge subdivision, playground improvements were spear-headed by Trustee Tracy Kellums and Parks Supervisor Jason Petty with input from Sturbridge residents and were completed in 2024.



Grounds & Shelters

With the opening of the new Graeter's Ice Cream on Montgomery Road in Kenwood, Kenwood Gardens has certainly gained popularity! In 2024, the Township completed a Beautification Project there so people can enjoy lovely new landscape beds and picnic tables as they relax in the green space or enjoy an ice cream cone.

The Township took advantage of several grant opportunities to make improvements to Bechtold Park in the last five years. COVID relief funds will be used to pay for the 2025 Bechtold Park Shelter 4 Reconstruction Project. This is the last of the four picnic shelters at Bechtold Park to be updated. All four shelters are available for residents to rent and enjoy for a small fee!

The total cost of the playground improvements, shelter reconstruction, and beautification project was \$598,000. Of that amount, \$319,000 (53%) was paid with grant funding and the remaining \$279,000 (47%) was funded through TIF dollars generated by the business district.

Events

The COVID pandemic also caused a temporary halt to popular events at Bechtold Park. The annual Dillonvale Luminaria was greatly missed for a couple of years. Residents in Dillonvale and throughout the Township were thrilled to have it back to enjoy hayrides to view holiday lights, Christmas Carols, and visits with Santa. Five years after COVID, we are happy to have residents out enjoying the beauty and amenities of our many parks!

One of the main responsibilities of a Township is to take care of its roads. Sycamore Township has 227 Township roads adding up to 51.44 miles of roads to maintain. Milling and paving a road is an expensive process, which is why the Township has always strived to use alternate materials to extend the life of our roads and find alternative sources of funding for road and sidewalk projects.

The events of 2020 did not slow us down. Instead, the last five years have seen those efforts go into overdrive! With the encouragement of the Board of Trustees, Road Superintendent Steve Reutelshofer and Assistant Superintendent Mike Gould have spent a lot of time and have been very successful in applying for and being awarded grants. These grants have helped fund both road and sidewalk projects as well as the many parks and recreation improvements discussed on page six.

Roads

In 2021, Sycamore Township conducted an ambitious Township-wide Road Improvement Program at a cost of \$3 million dollars. A project that extensive was not easy to coordinate in such a short time but was successfully orchestrated to take advantage of a legislation change during the pandemic which briefly allowed the use of TIF dollars to repair local roads. This meant that we could spend \$3 million to repair subdivision roads and it would be paid for by the business district as opposed to our residents' tax dollars.

The Township continues to have a road program in place every year to maximize the conditions of our roads and prevent any of them from falling into disrepair. In the last five years, we have made improvements to 80 percent of Township roads including 15 miles of pavement resurfacing and 22.8 miles of pavement preservation treatment! In addition, we have taken advantage of COVID relief funds and Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC) grants to make 437 feet of storm sewer improvements under roads on Donegal Dr., Gideon Ln., Mantell Ave., Wicklow Ave. and, in 2025, on Marieview Ct./Frane Lane.



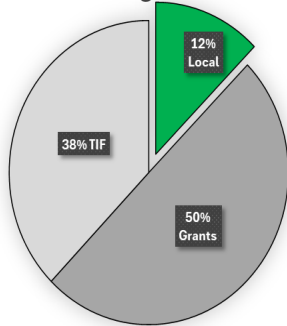
Maintenance Department

Sidewalks

With the help of COVID relief funds, SORTA, OPWC, and other grants, the Township has made tremendous progress in repairing existing sidewalks and building new sidewalks. From the south to the north, the Township has or will have built 33,000 feet of new sidewalks and made 38,200 feet of repairs to existing Township sidewalks. The walkability of the Township has been a priority for the Trustees, and it has been gratifying to see so many of our residents out and about getting exercise and walking to parks, churches, schools, and businesses.



Infrastructure Funding



Other upcoming projects to note include the 2025 Traffic Signal Preemption Project which will help safety services get where they need to be quickly in an emergency; and the 2025/2026 High Point Subdivision Drainage Improvements Study.

In the last five years, \$32 million has been spent on these and other infrastructure projects. The Township was able to fund almost half of that, or close to \$16 million, through grants awarded and another \$12 million (38%) with TIF funds generated by the business district.

2025 Trash Bash and Document Shredding

It's spring-cleaning time, and Sycamore Township is here to help! The annual Trash Bash and Document Shredding events for Sycamore Township residents are back this spring! Maintenance staff will be present at the Trash Bash to assist residents with the disposal of trash, junk, debris, old tires, used motor oil, construction materials, furniture, lawnmowers, appliances, and electronics. Mattresses and box springs will also be accepted if they are wrapped in plastic or a plastic mattress bag. Oil-based paint, household chemicals, and pesticides will be accepted at the SOUTH TRASH BASH ONLY. Latex paint and yard waste, including brush and leaves, will not be accepted. Latex paint may be taken to Matthew 25 Ministries at 11060 Kenwood Road.

At the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic in March, 2020, there were a lot of unknowns for Fire & EMS Departments. We all wondered how bad things would get. How will we keep EMS personnel from being exposed to infected patients? Will we be able to sufficiently staff our department if safety service personnel get sick and have to quarantine? What changes will we have to make within our department to ensure the safety and health of the citizens of Sycamore Township?

While state and local governments tried to figure out how to navigate the uncharted territory of a global pandemic, Congress passed the CARES Act in 2020 and the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) in 2021. Both of these Acts established funds to provide economic assistance to state and local governments with certain restrictions on how the money could be spent.

Sycamore Township Fire and EMS rose to the challenge of dealing with this sudden public health crisis by adapting to ever-changing guidelines and, under the guidance of the Board of Trustees, came up with a plan to thoughtfully and responsibly maximize the CARES Act and ARPA funds to improve services for our residents during the pandemic and into the future.

Following this plan, we have made tremendous technological and practical advancements that continue to benefit all Township Departments and the residents of Sycamore Township.

New Fire Truck and Ambulance

The Trustees had the foresight to encumber ARPA funds to place orders for a new fire truck and ambulance. The cost of new fire equipment has grown exponentially in recent years, with the Township's order coming in at almost \$1.5 million for both vehicles. The use of these funds to purchase desperately needed but very costly fire vehicles has enabled us to stay on schedule with the fire department's capital plan and ensure that we have reliable and technologically advanced firefighting and EMS vehicles to serve the community.



Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

The Fire Department made great strides in developing an inventory of PPE, sanitizers, gear, and equipment to reduce contamination and better serve EMS patients, all of which we continue to use today. Our firefighters now have MSA Cartridges to eliminate contaminants when needed and two sets of turnout firefighting gear to change out should one set become contaminated.

EMS Equipment

Prior to the pandemic we used grant money to purchase power cots for ambulances, which greatly reduces the risk of injury to Fire Department personnel when lifting and transporting patients. Our department uses a Lucas Device which is a battery-powered CPR machine that does chest compression nonstop, freeing paramedics to assist the patient in other ways while CPR is being administered. The use of the power cot and the Lucas Device reduces the number of personnel in contact with a contaminated patient. We also have sterile gloves, gowns, eye protection, and boot covers for infected patients. Our ambulances are equipped with breathing treatment tents that isolate contaminants. We use a dispenser to keep medications sterile and eliminate the handling of drugs by multiple people. This not only increases sanitization but also reduces the possibility of human error.

Training

Our Fire and EMS personnel have had multiple training courses to know the signs and symptoms and how to effectively treat a patient with a communicable disease and/or respiratory issues.

Sycamore Township Trustees and our dedicated first responders have made it their priority to build and maintain a Fire Department that has the knowledge, training, and equipment to provide high-quality service to our community. None of our residents want an ambulance called to their home due to a medical emergency, however, if that happens, you can be confident that the Sycamore Township Fire Department is prepared to provide you with the best care possible.

Welcome New Assistant Fire Chief

The Board of Trustees has hired Michael Fronimos as the Assistant Fire Chief in Sycamore Township. The new Assistant Chief will work alongside Fire Chief Penny to ensure that the Fire Department continues to bring our residents and business community the best EMS and Fire Safety services. Assistant Chief Fronimos' most recent position was that of Fire Chief for the Fort Gratiot Charter Township Fire Department in Michigan. He has also worked in fire departments in North Dakota, Virginia, and Kentucky, and brings over 30 years of emergency services experience to Sycamore Township. As we reflect on the last five years in Sycamore Township, we can probably agree that what we experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic was something we will tell our children and grandchildren about because it affected every aspect of life as we knew it. Terms like "social distancing", "proper hand washing", "booster shots", "e-learning" and "Zoom meetings" all became the norm. During Covid, we had ample time to reflect introspectively and look at societal norms, both good and bad. Antiquated styles of policing and old tactics did not fit anymore. "Defund the police" was a term we heard frequently. Social unrest demonstrations across the nation demanded police reform.

How did these events shape policing and affect how the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office served Sycamore Township over the last few years? We simply got better. The HCSO realized there were areas where we could improve in order to continue to be the best police agency we could be for the communities we serve.



Training

As a start, we implemented new required training for our deputies, with the purpose of better-serving society. We instituted Crisis Intervention Training (C.I.T.), Active Bystander for Law Enforcement Training (A.B.L.E), De-escalation and Minimizing Use of Force training, and Mental Health training to name just a few. We've taken great strides in educating our officers and bringing HCSO into the 21st Century.

Technology

The Sheriff's Office has also made improvements technologically. We implemented a new Records Management System (RMS) to improve our workflow and help communicate faster and better not only internally, but with you, the public. In the past, if you wanted a copy of a report, you had to physically obtain it by going downtown. Today, with our new RMS, it is as easy as uploading a document to your portable (cellular) device. We now have drones instead of helicopters which help us find criminal suspects and

assist in locating critical missing individuals, such as those with dementia. When dealing with people in mental health crises, drones fly overhead instead of helicopters to minimize anxiety. We've improved our tasers and our firearms, body-worn camera systems, and dash camera systems and interconnected all of these tools to promote transparency. Officers' actions are all caught on camera to ensure proper protocol is followed. The new tasers provide officers with less-lethal options to resolve or deter uses of force, something we all would like to see.

HCSO At Your Service

Lastly, we strive to be more open to the community through engagement. We are working hard to be available to Sycamore Township residents. Your Trustees had the foresight to recognize the financial benefits of contracting with the Sheriff's Office because we give you the best product at a reduced cost. Through this partnership, the Township is able to leverage HCSO resources such as RENU (Regional Narcotics Unit), Bomb Squad, K-9 Unit, and Investigation & Intelligence Division. In 2024 alone we participated in over a dozen events in Sycamore Township and are planning more in the future. As your District Commander, I am in the process of developing new events such as "Coffee with a Cop", "Books with Badges" and "Paletas con la Policia" (Popsicles with the Police) to reach and be available to as many of you as possible in 2025. We are committed to providing exceptional police services to you, our citizens.
